The Bulletin in Brief

This issue of the Bulletin contains **two articles** and ten arbitration-related court decisions, including five challenges of CAS/TAS awards.

The first article by *Philipp Habegger* sets out in a very comprehensive article the key changes to the **revised Swiss Rules of International Arbitration** that came into force on 1 June 2012 accompanied by a comparative table of articles.

Ulrich Haas and Anne Hossfeld then analyse the changes in the **new law on Swiss domestic arbitration** embedded in Art 353 et seq of the Swiss Code of Civil Procedure that are **relevant to sports arbitration**.

A summary of the decisions published in this issue is set out in the Introduction to the **Case Law** Section (p. 349), including:

- Three Supreme Court decisions addressing the validity of exclusion agreements under Art. 192 PIL Act, one dealing also with the extension of the arbitration agreement to nonsignatories;
- Several Supreme Court decisions, in particular in setting aside proceedings against CAS/TAS awards, recalling existing case law, including that internal contradictions in the reasoning of the award is not ground for challenge under Art 190 PIL Act; that there is no right to an oral hearing; that notification of the award by fax was not sufficient for 30 day time limit to challenge the award to be triggered (here under the CAS Code); public policy does not require two instances of jurisdiction to examine the case de novo; and
- The decision of the Court of Appeal of Paris of 17 November 2011 setting aside an arbitral award rendered in a case where a company which was being liquidated could not pay the advance on cost and accordingly had its counterclaims withdrawn from the proceedings (Société LICENSING PROJECTS S.L contre Société PIRELLI & C. SPA et al); the decision is commented by Carine Dupeyron and Flore Poloni.

Also included in this issue are the ASA local groups' activities and contact details, as well as the bibliography.
