Guest Editorial: Selected Perspectives on Sustainable Trade

The Covid-19 crisis has revealed the world's vulnerability to global shocks, and the necessity to prioritize non-trade objectives such as health and the environment. These exceptional circumstances have prompted an impetus to put these objectives back at the heart of the trading system and rethink the relationship between trade and those fundamental non-trade interests and objectives. On this occasion, we have rediscovered that the preamble to the Marrakesh Agreement Establishing the World Trade

Organization (WTO) refers to the objectives of 'sustainable development' and the protection and preservation of the environment. And that these principles have had little practical implementation so far. Perhaps only by way of exception (the WTO rules allow unilateral measures to pursue legitimate non-trade objectives that affect trade in certain conditions).

A crucial question to be answered is: how can we ensure that the environment is no longer considered as a mere

The Covid-19 crs has revealed the world's vulnerability to global shocks, and the necessity to prioritize non-trade issues. These exceptional circumstances have prompted a reflection on the relationship between trade and fundamental non-trade interests and objectives. One of the biggest looming shocks is climate change. The WTO and its Members are currently building on this momentum to elevate climate change on the trade agenda and rethink the relationship between trade and the environment. How can we ensure that the environment is no longer considered as a mere externality of trade and that the multilateral trading system actually fulfils its objective of sustainable development?

This topic is continuously discussed in the WTO Committee on Trade and Environment (CTE). During the Trade & Environment Week at the WTO, in November of 2020, a group of WTO Members declared their intention to initiate 'structured discussions' to advance work on trade and environmental sustainability, and a dialogue with external stakeholders such as academics, businesses, civil society members.

The current chair and former chairs of the CTE will debated on:

- $\ \, \text{The current WTO approach to trade \& the environment and its shortcomings in pursuing sustainable development goals;}$
- Whether and how to rethink the relationship between trade and environment at the WTO;
- New initiatives and on-going negotiations at the WTO;
- Engagement with external stakeholders;

Possible reforms, and the way forward (with a new US administration and a new WTO Director General).
