Intertax is one of the most highly regarded international tax journals. It has subscribers on every continent, nearly half universities, and the remainder law firms and governmental institutions. For thirty years, Fred de Hosson was the General Editor for Intertax. He managed this monthly journal uninterrupted. Fred de Hosson, with whom I have had the privilege to work for ten years as a member of the editorial board, has chosen to retire in 2018. I will now assume the task of replacing him. I will not be replacing him, of course, but will be assuming his responsibilities. My task is simplified by the fact that I am accompanied by an exceptional team composed of the editorial board, advisory board and literature review editors, plus a long list of blind peer reviewers, assistants and, certainly, Kluwer.

My challenge is to keep the journal as interesting as it has been, contributing to the international debate. This is also an opportunity to rethink about and introduce new features to Intertax, in order to stimulate our current readers, prospective readers and potential authors.

As stated in our author guidelines, as of this issue all articles are submitted to double-blind peer-review (including special editions). Other types of manuscripts, such as country notes, case notes, literature reviews, and

debates are submitted to rigorous scrutiny by the board. In summary, we will aim to publish:

- ground-breaking articles on international taxation, European taxation, and both direct and indirect taxation in countries around the world with transnational repercussion;
- critical analysis of regional trends in taxation and developments in multinational taxation emanating from organizations such as the OECD, the EU, the WTO and the United Nations;
- special issues focusing on current and controversial tax developments;
- debates regarding controversial issues in tax policy;
- notes on topical tax developments with cross-border impact, as well as case notes on relevant court decisions on international and EU tax issues; and
- literature reviews (including books and ground-breaking papers).
